THE STARS WILL COME FALLING FROM HEAVEN

In Mark's gospel today, Jesus speaks about the end times, describing cosmic events and the coming of the Son of Man. He emphasizes the importance of being watchful and ready, as no one knows the exact time of these events. This passage, though apocalyptic, offers profound insights for our contemporary lives.

Reflecting on this passage in today's world, we can draw several meaningful lessons. First, the imagery of the sun darkening and stars falling can remind us of the uncertainties and challenges we face in life. Whether it's personal struggles, global crises, or environmental issues, these "cosmic" disturbances can feel overwhelming. Yet, Jesus' message is one of hope and assurance.
